# VINNA'S STORY

BURNT AT A YOUNG AGE. VINNA'S FUTURE IS LOOKING MUCH BRIGHTER THANKS TO YOU

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In March 2011, a team of Interplast volunteers met 10-month-old Vinna in Vientiane, Laos. The left side of her body was pink and scarred and her severely burnt arm poked through her flowery sundress. Her contracted hand stretched backwards as it fused tightly onto her forearm.

Vinna sustained her horrific burns months earlier when she and her mother were trapped in a house fire. Unfortunately, her mother passed away and she has since been cared for by her grandmother. As the months progressed, her untreated burns contracted. The burnt skin on Vinna's ankle, elbow, armpit and hand tightened. It became taut. And it

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constricted so much that her function on the left side of body began to diminish. She could no longer use her left hand.

Vinna's burn scar contractures were released on that Interplast trip in order to restore as much function as possible. She also received another operation to release additional contractures in late 2011. And the outcome is encouraging: "Vinna's one of those really memorable patients," explained Dr James Savundra, an

Interplast plastic surgeon who, since 2001, has volunteered on 14 surgical and training trips. "We've operated on her on two separate trips, both to release her burn scar contractures on the left hand side of her body. Given that she was treated at such a young age, and shortly after she sustained her burns, her hand function, which was very limited when we first met her, is virtually normal! She has healthy function."

With check-ups since then, she's

"I have been involved with Interplast for the last six years primarily in the Nepalese microsurgical program. I began my involvement soon after gaining my fellowship and have since become the Country Coordinator for Nepal. I would recommend it highly to junior and senior surgeons as well

as anaesthetic and nursing staff alike. Microsurgery has transformed reconstructive surgery and we are now able to bring the benefits of it to the developing world. We undoubtedly live in the best country in the world and it is luck that most of us were born here. I feel incredibly fortunate to be able to practice in my chosen profession and believe that it is of paramount importance to give something back to the underprivileged. While there are different levels of charitable action, (most centre around personal motivations for giving) my personal satisfaction derives from the fact that the program in Nepal is primarily educational rather than service provision alone. The training and education given to the local surgeons has allowed them to perform complicated microsurgical procedures independently, which is always in more trying and difficult conditions than we are afforded here. It means there is a lasting legacy for future generations of Nepalese microsurgeons! From a professional development perspective, I derive a number of benefits which are not always tangible. Certainly there is an immense sense of immediate satisfaction treating patients with 'incurable' problems, however, the richness of the cultural experience remains with you for a lifetime."

Thanks to the wonderful work of the Interplast team, as well as the work of the WIG volunteers to raise money for Vinna, she will lead a better life. That's pretty incredible."

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
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#### SCHOLARSHIP ANNOUNCEMENT

One of the pioneers of plastic and reconstructive surgery in Australia, Sir Benjamin Rank was instrumental in the establishment of Interplast 30 years ago. Having served as a Board Director and President from 1985 to 2000, his influence on Interplast's identity is undeniable. In honour of his contributions, a scholarship in his name has been set up.

Announced by his grandson, Sam Gray, at Interplast's 30th celebrations in Perth, the scholarship will support a surgeon from the Asia Pacific region to visit Australia for a short-term

observational placement. This will develop their area of expertise and, by extension, strengthen the surgical services in their home country. "It is a wonderful privilege for the family of Sir Benjamin to commence a scholarship in his honour," said Sam Gray of his grandfather's scholarship. "For us, this celebrates his legacy in the 30th year of Interplast and the perpetuation of his contribution through training other surgeons, and ultimately improving health outcomes as well as raising the bar for standards of surgery across developing regions in Asia and the Pacific."
