### HELP FOR A FAMILY

YOUR SUPPORT HAS CHANGED THE LIVES OF A FAMILY IN THE SOLOMON ISLANDS

A family of six won the hearts of our Interplast team on their recent trip to the Solomon Islands. The team met the family in Gizo in July on a surgical program activity that included two surgeons, an anaesthetist and two nurses.

Three of the four children in the family, as well as their father, presented with cleft lips and/or palates. Whilst there can be a family history associated with the condition, it is unusual to see so many cases in one nuclear family.

Thanks to our supporters, Interplast was able to provide treatment for the three children.

At just 8 months of age, the youngest child, Nathan (pictured above) had bilateral cleft lip and palate, meaning that

both sides of his mouth were affected. The Interplast team successfully repaired Nathan's lip, and on our next visit will repair his palate, as at his age it would be too much for him to have both procedures completed at the same time.

Nathan's older brother, Max, 5, was also treated by the Interplast team, along with his older sister Cecelia, 12. Cecelia had previously had her lip and palate repaired, but developed a fistula (an opening that can appear in the palate after surgery), that required further surgery to repair.

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The children's father is in his 40's, and underwent surgery in his childhood for cleft lip and palate, but these repairs have not been completely successful, and he asked that the Interplast team treat him on their next visit.

The effect of an untreated cleft lip or palate is undeniable. Infants often cannot breastfeed, resulting in dehydration or malnutrition. In many cultures, people with cleft lips and cleft palates carry significant stigma. The social impact associated with these conditions can restrict access to

# VOLUNTEER YOUR THOUGHTS...

In August I made my first trip with Interplast, joining the volunteer team who travelled to Cagayan de Oro, Philippines on a general surgical and reconstructive program.

With a vibrant history of medical volunteering experience that includes a few months in Pakistan in the 1980's, trips to

both the highlands and desert of Ethiopia, and a stint in PNG working with isolated hill communities, I was excited for a new challenge.

In my experience, on medical volunteer trips to developing countries, there is often limited equipment and support, which can severely limit the possible outcomes of the work. The Interplast effort is so well organised, well equipped and well supported, that the outcomes are significantly affected. We can achieve great results in a short period of time.

Our trip was a huge success, and on reflecting, I think there are a number of reasons for it.

Firstly, the Interplast volunteer team showed an amazing camaraderie. With long days, difficult circumstances and tired teams, emotions can sometimes run high. There was no sign of disharmony in this experienced team. Everyone contributes. Everyone gets in and gets the job done. All difficulties are managed. This is a true testament to the professionalism of the team.

Secondly, the level of local support was astonishing. The local Rotary club spread word across the large island that we were visiting (Mindanao). Committed to making our access to patients easy, they found patients and helped with their transport, many of them children with severe conditions, who would have been ostracised from their communities. The impact that this kind of support has on the outcomes we can achieve cannot be overestimated.

The reward for me ultimately, is the difference you can make in the lives of these children. To see the gratitude from their parents, and to know you have had a hand in improving the quality of life and self-esteem of these children, will stay with me forever.

I feel absolutely privileged to have been a part of this experience, and to have worked with such a committed and capable team.

education and work opportunities, and this restriction can spill over into the family's interaction with the community.

In a matter of a few short hours, our reconstructive surgery changes this. The successful treatment and repair of cleft lip and cleft palate can play an essential role in improving the health of patients and the lives and livelihoods of their families.

Despite, or perhaps because of the circumstances in which they live, the family we met in the Solomon Islands was incredibly close, and very grateful to the Interplast volunteer team. The children's mother and grandparents were there for every moment. Jan, one of our volunteer nurses who treated this family said "they have this real sense of community, and I think that's what makes them so resilient. Life's hard, but they just get on with it".

### **RECENT AND UPCOMING TRIPS**

#### REPAIRING BODIES AND REBUILDING LIVES ACROSS THE ASIA PACIFIC

The demand for our services continues to grow, and thanks to you we continue delivering on our twin-track approach: performing life changing surgery, and delivering training and mentoring activities that develop the skills and knowledge of local medical professionals in the developing countries we visit.

To the right is a snapshot of what we've achieved in the past few months.

Additionally, we supported the annual Mongolian Society of Anaesthetists Conference in Ulanbaatar in June (an annual training and capacity development opportunity for anaesthetists throughout the country). Planning and evaluation program activities were also undertaken in Mongolia in June.

To cap it off, in August we attended the Pacific Island Surgical Association conference in Fiii. In the next few months we have volunteer teams departing for the Solomon Islands, PNG, Tonga, Myanmar, Samoa, Singapore, Philippines, Fiji and Sri Lanka. Additionally, in October, we have two female anaesthetists from Indonesia coming to Ballarat for a month of mentoring.
